With the huge numbers of diabetes patients and complications we are dealing with, overall health expenditure per person is much lesser as compared to the developed countries.

AUTISM RATE DOUBLES IN US TO ONE IN 45 KIDS

Autism affects one in 45 children in the United States, almost twice the rate from a few years ago, said a survey Friday that uses a new approach to assess the frequency of the developmental disorder. The latest figures may reflect a more accurate picture of autism spectrum disorder, said the report by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's (CDC) National Center for Health Statistics, and so does not necessarily mean that there is a ballooning autism epidemic.

SOON, BATTERY-FREE PACEMAKERS POWERED BY HEART

Scientists are developing next-generation battery-free implantable pacemakers that may be powered by an unlikely source - the heart itself. The advancement is based upon a piezoelectric system that converts vibrational energy - created inside the chest by each heartbeat - into electricity to power the pacemaker. The technology may eliminate the medical risks, costs and inconvenience of having a battery replacement every five to 12 years for millions of people worldwide. Karami, who is leading the research, initially designed a flat piezoelectric structure for a conventional pacemaker which is running at a range of 7 to 700 beats per minute.

ARTIFICIAL PANCREAS PERFORMED WELL IN HUMANS IN US

A team of the US researchers has developed a functional artificial pancreas that has performed well in humans in clinical settings. Developed by combining mechanical artificial pancreas technology with transplantation of islet cells which produce insulin. In a study of 14 patients with pancreatitis who underwent standard surgery and auto-islet transplantation treatments, a closed-loop insulin pump was better than multiple daily insulin injections for maintaining normal blood glucose levels.

CANADIAN DOCTORS MAKE SCAR-FREE PLASTIC SURGERY POSSIBLE

A team of doctors has conducted what they say is the first scar-free facial reconstruction in the history of plastic surgery in Canada which was led by Daniel Borsuk from Hopital Maisonneuve-Rosemont, a hospital in Montreal, the doctors accomplished the operation in an adult patient in about eight hours & doctors carried out the facial reconstruction using virtual surgery and 3D models, with no scars left at all. In the past, this type of procedure would have necessitated multiple interventions and left one or more scars, the doctors said.

NEW EBOLA VACCINE SAFE, STIMULATES STRONG IMMUNE RESPONSE

A fresh clinical trial of a new Ebola vaccine has found that it is well tolerated, safe and stimulates strong immune responses in adults in Mali, West Africa and in the US. The study included the first testing of this vaccine in adult health care workers and other at-risk persons in Africa.

It identified the dose to be used in subsequent clinical trials and for large-scale manufacture of the vaccine.

PRADHAN MANTRI SWASTHYA SURAKSHA YOJANA (PMSSY)

The Pradhan MantriSwasthya Suraksha Yojana (PMSSY) aims at correcting the imbalances in the availability of affordable healthcare facilities in the different parts of the country in general, and augmenting facilities for quality medical education in the under-served States in particular. The scheme was approved in March 2006.

The first phase in the PMSSY has two components - setting up of six institutions in the line of AIIMS; andupgradation of 13 existing Government medical college institutions.

Six AIIMS have been set up under the Pradhan Mantri Swasthya Suraksha Yojana in Patna, Jodhpur, Bhopal, Bhubaneswar, Rishikesh and Raipur

In the second phase of PMSSY, the Government has approved the setting up of two more AIIMS-like institutions, one each in the States of West Bengal and Uttar Pradesh and upgradation of six medical college institutions in Amritsar, Himachal Pradesh, Tamil Nadu, Maharashtra, Aligarh and Rohtak. In the third phase of PMSSY, it is proposed to upgrade some of the existing medical college institutionsin Uttar Pradesh, Madhya Pradesh, Bihar, Kerela, Karnataka.


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
